


Spending more than six months now in a senior coaching role at Adelaide City has for me made me very thankful about the journey I have started.

ATALANTA BC COORDINATORS UPDATE

The Atalanta BC clinic at Adelaide City's junior headquarters begin next week.

The clinic provides training for young football players and will be held every Friday from May 12 to May 26. The training sessions will take place at the Unley grounds on pitch 1, in front of the Unley Road clubrooms, from 5.30pm to 6.30 pm. The clinic has already secured 55 players between the ages of 12 and 17, with both girls and boys participating. However, the coordinators believe this is just the beginning of what the future holds for the clinic. To make the clinic even more enjoyable, the organisers have teamed up with the events committee to provide a free sausage and bread for each player after training. Each player will receive a ticket to present at the canteen to get their food.

To ensure easy identification of players during the training sessions, the organisers have purchased 60 numbered bibs in three different colours. The bibs will feature the Adelaide City and Atalanta BC logos printed on the front.

All sessions will be recorded for Domenico Gangemi – the head of Atalanta BC's Oceania affiliation to review and provide feedback to the coordinators. This information is essential to the clinic's progress. The Atalanta BC clinic is a great opportunity for young football players to develop their skills and grow as athletes. The clinic offers expert training from experienced coaches and provides an environment that is both supportive and challenging. Participants in the Atalanta BC clinic can expect to improve their ball control, passing accuracy, and agility, among other skills. The clinic's coaches will use drills and exercises to help players build their confidence, develop their game sense, and improve their teamwork.

Overall, the Atalanta BC clinic is a fantastic opportunity for young football players to take their skills to the next level. With expert coaching, supportive teammates, and a challenging environment, the clinic promises to be an unforgettable experience for all involved.

I come from a very football-oriented family.

My father and his three brothers have been involved in the game their entire lives, playing and winning championships together in Tasmania, and making the Leszczynski family name very well known in the state. I've grown up watching my father play and believe it or not, he has spent most of his career as a striker.

As a defender, I obviously don't take after him in that regard, but he is the reason I fell in love with football in the first place, and his continued support of my footballing journey is second to none.

My footballing journey began in Tasmania when I was five, playing for a school team dominated by boys, before going into state and NTC programs from age 12 onwards. I made the move to SA for university, but also to be challenged football-wise. I remember trialing with a few different clubs at the beginning of 2021 and being drawn to Adelaide City.

THE ART OF PROTEST

If you're on #SokkahTwitter, you'll see that the recent discourse has been dominated by the topic of boycotting the A-League Men Grand Final which is to take place in Sydney after the Australian Professional Leagues (APL) announced the decision last December. Rightfully so, many clubs, players, and supporters were appalled and began a boycott, walking out at the 20th minute of games. This momentum, however, was stunted after the actions at the Melbourne Derby where a pitch invasion took place and several people, notably City keeper Tom Glover, were injured. But now as the Grand Final nears, talk of boycotts has arisen with renewed vigour and created a Twitter feed of polemics.

It would therefore be remiss of me not to write about the 1961 South Australian Split, an act of protest from a majority of leading ethnic clubs against the established Anglo-Australian governing body.

This Split was no doubt inspired by events from 1957 to 1959 in NSW that became known as the Immigrant Soccer Revolution. Unlike in South Australia, migrant clubs in NSW were not prominent in the First Division due to two policies: the first was that clubs were required to represent a specific district; the second stipulated that matches must be held at a ground of suitable guality. Ethnic clubs struggled with regard to the latter policy as the best grounds were already in the possession of established Anglo-Australian clubs. These two policies antagonised the ethnic clubs that played superior football, but were prohibited from entering the First Division. Furthermore, migrants were dissatisfied with how their clubs had virtually no say in the management of football. Ill-feelings amongst the ethnic clubs towards the administrators reached boiling point in 1957 when Hakoah (the Jewish-based club) was denied promotion to the First Division

despite winning the Division Two championship and therefore warranting promotion. This precipitated the formation of a breakaway rival administration and league by Hakoah President, Walter Sternberg, called the New South Wales Federation of Soccer Clubs (NSWFSC). Various Anglo-Australian clubs that were aware of the strength and passion of ethnic clubs consequently joined the NSWFSC. It was the first national example of ethnic clubs challenging the Anglo-Australian bureaucracy by pioneering the formation of breakaway associations. Similar events occurred in Western Australia in 1960 and Queensland in 1961.

At the Annual General meeting of the South Australia Soccer Football Association (SASFA). prior to the 1961 season, leading ethnic clubs proposed several alterations to the rules which were rejected by clubs from the lower divisions. Representatives of the ethnic teams, incensed at the decision, walked out of the meeting and started the new South Australian Federation of Soccer Clubs. In the new league were seven ethnic clubs (Beograd, Budapest, Croatia, Juventus, Lion, Orange, and Polonia) and one Australian team (Cumberland). They claimed that they should be entitled to greater voting power as they had the largest following and contributed more to the game than minor clubs. The new Federation believed themselves to be a truly democratic institution. In the Editor's Foreword of the Federation's 1963 Handbook, Antonio Giordano (an Italian migrant and founding-council member of the Federation) praised the 'truly democratic' rules which 'eliminate[d] once and for all the dictatorial idea on "government from the top"'.

Monopoly of power and control, now in the hands of the clubs, was considered to be the 'only way to progress efficiently, satisfactorily and harmoniously towards the establishment of our game as THE football game nationally

played in every corner of the Commonwealth.' New rules were drawn up by the Federation which granted significant power to the clubs, namely Clause 27 which announced that 'The control business and affairs of the Federation shall be under the management of the Council of Clubs.' In other words, power to the people.

Ultimately, the Federation proved to be unrivalled in its appeal and its high standard of play, with the majority of spectators watching their games at Thebarton Oval, whereas only a handful frequented Hindmarsh for SASFA games. By 1962, the two bodies had amalgamated to create the South Australian Soccer Federation Incorporated (SASF), Though there is no definitive document that clarifies the reasons for the merger, it is safe to assume that the survival of the old SASFA depended on the power and popularity of the newly established Federation of Clubs.

Many years have elapsed since the South Australian Split, and the football landscape has changed dramatically since the days of old. However, the one thing that has persisted is the theme of how football in this country should be administrated, and opinions range from conservative to revolutionary. NAME

1. The name of the Association is the "SOUTH AUSTRA-LIAN SOCCER FEDERATION INCORPORATED".

OBJECTS

- 2. The objects of the Federation are: (a) To promote foster and develop the game of Soccer Football.
- (b) To arrange organise conduct and control soccer football games and competitions.
